For over a year now, we have been giving serious consideration to completing a project that has been over 20 years in the planning stages. We have not kept this project a secret. In the Spring of 2106, we sent out over 5,000 electronic surveys to our community to determine the level of interest in completing our plans to build a modern gymnasium and additional classrooms to accommodate our current enrollment. We received over 750 responses to that electronic survey which is a great rate of return. Additionally, we had over 90 families who came in to participate in individual conversations regarding this project. In both cases, the responses we received were exceptionally supportive of such a project to address our facility challenges.

After the return of such positive results from the interviews and the online survey, our Board of Directors carefully considered the findings and decided that our community was ready to embark on this project in earnest. Over the past year, we have begun to assemble a team of over 100 volunteers who

have helped us think about and plan for the major fundraising effort that will be necessary to complete this project. In August 2017, it is our plan to formally announce and embark upon a major capital campaign. Though we have completed many capital improvements at Roncalli over the years, this will be the first capital campaign that we have conducted since 2005 when we completed the Building Faith and Futures Campaign to construct the Fine Arts Center and classrooms, our guidance offices, and the STARS resource center. We received more than \$4.5 million in pledges to that particular campaign. With rising construction costs and the expensive nature of our current needs, we would expect our new goal to be higher than our last campaign.

In addition to the new gymnasium and new classrooms to accommodate our student body, we also plan to embark on a much-needed expansion and renovation to increase our food preparation and service capacity. Our current kitchen area and cafeteria were built to accommodate a student body of 750. With today's enrollment of 1,200 students we find ourselves in need of addressing this area of our facility as well.

To accomplish such an aggressive expansion project we will need to acquire new property. For the past several years we have been in productive dialogue with some of our neighbors and we have made substantial progress on these

necessary acquisitions. We will formally confirm that progress as a part our campaign announcement.

There is no doubt that this will be a challenging project for our school community. However, the past generosity of our alumni, parents, friends, and other benefactors gives us great hope and confidence that we can successfully meet these challenges in a way that gives our students and teachers the tools that they need to be successful and to fulfill their potential as lifelong learners in service to others.

I ask that you please join us in praying for our students and teachers. The families that we serve are raising children in challenging times. There are cultural, political, and economic pressures that all of our families face as they try to bring up their children in accordance with Catholic traditions. In order to help meet these challenges, a first-class Catholic high school needs a facility that matches the magnitude of the work that needs to be done. Our Catholic communities have a centuries-old tradition of providing what is needed for the work that God has called us to carry on. The Roncalli Family has certainly added to that Catholic tradition over the past couple of decades.

I hope and pray that you will help us add to that legacy as we launch this campaign. God bless you and all of those dear to you and every good way!


Senior Picnic



GRIMES EARNS TWO AWARDS

Physics teacher Benjamin Grimes was honored with two prestigious teaching awards in less than one month. Grimes first was bestowed the American Association of Physics Teachers Outstanding Teacher of the Year Award for the state of Indiana on April 22nd at the University of Indianapolis. He was selected over hundreds of candidates on the criteria of five plus years of teaching experience, innovative instructional techniques, collaboration with other teachers and leadership.



The following week, Grimes was awarded the Samuel F. Hulbert Outstanding Teacher of the Year for Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology. Grimes was nominated by two of his former Physics students, Nate Eble and Matthew White, who are now freshman mechanical engineering students at Rose-Hulman. It is the first time that two students recommended the same teacher for this award.

When asked about why Mr. Grimes was being nominated, Nate Eble said, "He helped instill confidence in me to try my hardest. He believed I could get into Rose-Hulman when I never thought I could." Matthew White added "Mr. Grimes helps those who have no interest in Math and Science to see all of the great aspects of such subjects by presenting material in a way that truly captures the attention and interest of his students."

Grimes' love of Physics resonates throughout his classes at Roncalli High School. His students are enthusiastic to learn about everything from falling objects and forces to electricity and magnetism through hands-on educational experiences, many times outside of the classroom. Away from the classroom, Grimes serves with the Roncalli Senior Retreat program and as a mentor on school-sponsored service trips to the Appalachian region of West Virginia.

RONCALLI RAISES MONEY TO HELP WATER WITH BLESSINGS

When senior Cassidy McMahon came back from a mission trip to Haiti, she was moved to continue to help. "I heard a statistic about the dangers of unclean water that made me sure that this was the issue that I needed to help solve. Half of all the hospital beds in the world are filled with people who are sick because of unclean water," McMahon said. So, she approached Roncalli and St. Mark parish to see if they would be willing to help and both schools offered to have their Lenten Almsgiving projects benefit Water with Blessings (WWB).

WWB provides water filters to mothers in developing countries who do not have access to clean, convenient water. These women then become missionaries of water, known as Water Women, but also of the Gospel messages and blessings of the organization. Each water woman then is called to share their filter with three other mothers, spreading the blessings throughout. With the funds raised by Roncalli, over 288 filters will be distributed to those in need.

At the beginning of Lent, Campus Ministry set a challenging goal for the school: to raise \$15,000 for Water with Blessings and they not only met that goal, they surpassed it to raise a total of \$17,326! "This Lent, Roncalli supported a truly amazing cause and exhibited incredible generosity that made me proud to be a Rebel," said McMahon.

Boys Track 2017 Review

The boys' track team performed its best in the biggest meets of the year. The squad captured the team titles at the Archdiocesan Championship and the inaugural Circle City Conference Championship. At the conference meet, the Rebels won individual titles in eight of the 16 events. At the sectional, the team finished third, which tied its best finish since 2003. The Rebels had an individual sectional champion, three runners-up and 11 regional qualifiers. At the regional, the Rebels had an individual champion and two additional state qualifiers. This season's track team numbered nearly 100 athletes, which is the largest team in program history.

Senior Gabe Otley qualified for regional in the 400 meters with a third-place finish in sectional, before winning the regional the following week. He is the team's first regional champion since 2012. His regional title put him in the state final, where he ran a career-best 49.80 and finished 13th. Otley's performance at the state final earned him a spot on the Indiana All-Star track team, becoming the first athlete in program history to be named to the team. Sophomore Nick Perkins won the sectional 3200-meter title for the program's only sectional title in 2017. The following week, he finished third at regional and became the program's first-ever state qualifier in the 3200 meters. Senior Will English advanced through the postseason to qualify for the state final in the discus.



Gabe Otley earned the team's MVP award. Senior **Kurt Cunningham** won the team's mental attitude award. Sophomore **Grant Latimer** was named the most improved athlete. **Owen Herndon** was the freshman MVP. **Nick Perkins** was awarded the sophomore MVP and **Myles Lyngh** was the junior MVP. **Will English** won senior MVP honors.

Seniors Kurt Cunningham, Will English, Timmy Miller, Neil O'Brien, Gabe Otley, Michael Otley and Luke Smock, along with juniors Cade Morgan and Nicholas Plahitko were all named Academic All-State by the Indiana Association of Track and Cross Country Coaches (IATCC). Seniors Luke Matis, Jacob Reiber and Tyler Swiezy and juniors Hayden Moran, Ethan Newett and Sam Sedgwick earned honorable mention Academic All-State honors. Roncalli boys track had more first-team academic all-state selections than any other program in the state.



Girls Track 2017 Review



The girls track season culminated in three school records set during the postseason and the program's second-ever state champion and first since 2002. Senior Paige Saylor capped a stellar track career with a school-record long jump of 19 feet, one inch at the state finals, earning her a state title. She broke her own school record of 18 feet, 10 inches (set during last year's regional) and finished an inch and half ahead of second place. Saylor joins Anna Weber (2002, shot put) as Roncalli's only girls track state champions.

Two relay teams set school records in the regional. The 4X100 relay team of Saylor, seniors Josie Asher and Morgan Clarke and freshman Emily **Sonderman** established a new record of 49.39 and advanced to the state final. The same four runners set a new school mark in the 4X400 with a 4:05.49.



Saylor and Sonderman shared team MVP honors. Sonderman qualified for the state finals in the long jump and was one of four freshmen in the field. She also ran the second-fastest 400-meter time in school history. Senior Marisa Bryans turned in the third-fastest time in school history in the 100-meter hurdles and the fifth-best high jump. Junior Grace Lawrie advanced to regional in the 100 hurdles and senior Emma Schmidt made it to regional in the shot put. Also moving on to the regional was the 4X800 relay team of juniors Danielle Henke, Izzy Jahnke and Kate Morse and freshman Mary Roesner. Senior hurdler and jumper Claire Whalen earned the team's mental attitude award.



Baseball 2017 Review

The baseball team registered an 18-10-1 record and repeated as sectional champions, despite graduating 10 seniors from last year's state championship squad. The Rebels defeated Perry Meridian (6-0) and Southport (5-1) to win the program's 13th sectional title. Prior to this season, the last time the Rebels won consecutive sectional titles was in 1998 and 1999. The Rebels defeated Avon (6-2) in the regional semifinal before falling 5-2 to Cathedral, the eventual undefeated state champion, in the regional final. The Rebels also advanced to the final of the Marion County Tournament.

Sophomore outfielder **Tommy Hansen** entered the national high school record books on April 7. In a game played in Louisville against Metamora

Township from Illinois, Hansen became the first player in national high school history to hit a grand slam in three straight plate appearances. He finished the game 3-for-3 and drove in all 12 runs in a 12-1 Roncalli victory.

Junior outfielder/pitcher Nick Schnell was named Marion County player of the year and earned a spot on the American Family Insurance All-USA Indy-area baseball Super Team. He was also selected to the inaugural All-Circle City Conference team. Hansen and junior infielders Hayden Harper and Harrison Koppenhofer joined Schnell on the all-conference team. Harper and Hansen were also picked for the all-county squad.










Softball 2017 Review

The softball team logged another 20-win season, finishing with a 22-7 record and as the runners-up in the sectional. The team met its goal of winning at least 20 games and of capturing the inaugural Circle City Conference championship. After dropping two games during the regular season to Decatur Central, the Rebels lost a tight 1-0 affair in the sectional final to the Hawks, who were also Marion County champions.

Junior Jordan Jenkins and freshman Amber **Linton** split the team MVP award. Either Jenkins (11 wins) or Linton (10 wins) was the winning pitcher in 21 of the team's 22 victories. Junior shortstop Amanda Prather was the team's offensive player of the year. Junior second baseman Lauren Fey earned the team's defensive player of the year award, after winning offensive player of the year last season. Fey was also named large school third team all-state by the Indiana Coaches of Girls Sports Association (ICGSA). All four players – Jenkins, Linton, Prather and Fey – were named All-Marion County and All-Circle City Conference. The team's lone seniors – Abby Hickson and Maddie Faust - were both named honorable mention academic all-state by the ICGSA.







Boys Volleyball 2017 Review

The Rebels worked through a season full of obstacles to post a 32-10 record and a trip to the semi-state. The team used 17 different players throughout the season and didn't have a consistent starting lineup until the state tournament. In the semi-state match, starting setter Sam Eiland went down with an ankle injury in the second set and the Rebels lost in four sets to second-ranked Noblesville. Along the way, the Rebels won their ninth consecutive regional championship and captured the first-ever Circle City Conference championship.

Senior Conor Cunningham was named the team's MVP, as well as the team's defensive player of the year. Senior Matthew Woodruff joined Cunningham on the All-Circle City Conference team and was a finalist of the Indy Star's state player of the year. He also won the team's mental attitude award. Junior Jacob Luedeman was also an all-conference selection, as was junior Sam Eiland. Eiland earned the team's offensive player of the year award. The Indiana Boys Volleyball Coaches Association (IBVCA) tabbed Cunningham, Woodruff and Eiland as all-state selections. Senior Billy Wincek was chosen to the all-tournament team by the state's coaches.



Wincek, Cunningham, Woodruff and juniors Conner Gore, Kyle Carpenter, Michael Frausto, Murphy McManama and Patrick McManama were all named to the IBVCA Academic All-State team. Five players — Cunningham, Luedeman, Carpenter, Frausto and Eiland — were selected to participate in the United States Volleyball Association (USAV) Talent Showcase. Only 50 players were chosen nationally to be involved with the event. Sam Eiland, Michael Frausto, junior Blake Powell, sophomore Zach Straumins and freshman Zach Mayer were picked to train with the USA National team and coaches for a week.

Three players entered the program record book. Connor Cunningham set a new season-record for digs (364). Sam Eiland established a new single-season assist record with 950 and Jacob Luedeman broke the single-season kills record with 250.



Girls Tennis 2017 Review

The girls' tennis team posted one of its best seasons in recent years, finishing with a 17-5 record and capturing the program's first sectional title since 2013 and 10th overall. In the sectional final, the Rebels defeated Franklin Central 3-2, with the trophy-clinching victory coming in the number-two doubles match. Juniors Ally Lewis and Lauren Liberto won 6-2, 4-6, 7-6 (7-4) and sealed the victory in a thrilling third-set tiebreaker. After

defeating Triton Central 5-0 in the regional final, the team dropped a 3-2 decision to state-ranked Center Grove in the regional final.

Freshman Emma Hess won an individual sectional title and advanced to the regional. She also earned the team's MVP award. Senior Kathleen Ditton won the team's mental attitude award. Senior Abby Yohler was named first team Academic All-State.









Boys Golf 2017 Review

The boys golf team accomplished its goal of winning the inaugural Circle City Conference championship. The team improved throughout the season and shot its season-best score (311) in the sectional. That score was good for a fourth-place finish, but was one spot away from regional advancement. The Rebels' score of 311 was the lowest score in the state among teams that didn't advance to regional and was good enough to win over half of the 30 sectionals statewide. The Rebels' sectional included the eventual state champion (Center Grove) and the top two individuals in the state championship.

Junior Evan Wray shot a 75 in the sectional and was an individual regional qualifier. He also earned the team's MVP award. Junior Drew Fleming won the team's mental attitude award. The regular season featured many individual highlights. Fleming birdied three of his final four holes to help the team win a match. Freshman Mark Poole shot a 75 at The Trophy Club and finished high against the strongest field in the state. His brother, freshman Luke Poole, medaled in two of his first three high school matches. Junior Logan Schott fired a 37 at Sagamore. The team was the only Roncalli squad in 2016-17 to compete without a senior on the roster.









Lacrosse 2017 Review

The lacrosse team finished the 2017 campaign in strong fashion, winning six of its final nine games. The team started the season 0-4, facing off against some of the state's top teams. After averaging 1.8 goals over the season's first four games, the squad averaged 8.1 goals over the season's final stretch and topped 10 goals four times. Junior Evan Schiefelbein earned the team's MVP award for the second straight season. Senior Campbell Davis was selected to play in the Indiana High School Lacrosse Association East versus West Showcase. Davis established a new program record for career points and sophomore Erik Alstatt set a new mark for single-season assists (22). Junior Brent Wampler won the team's mental attitude award. Sophomore goalie Nolan Hoffman was chosen to the All-Circle City Conference team.

RONCALLI ATHLETES TO COMPETE COLLEGIATELY


Roncalli High School seniors Max Bridgewater, Dakota Solonka, Christian Stewart and Patrick Waugh signed letters of intent to compete collegiately.



HANSEN SETS NATIONAL RECORD



On April 7, 2017, Roncalli sophomore outfielder **Tommy Hansen** hit three grand slams in three consecutive at-bats, driving in all 12 runs in Roncalli's 12-1 victory over Metamora Township (Ill.) High School in a game played in Louisville, Kentucky. Hansen finished 3-for-3 in the game.

According to the National Federation of State High School Associations' online baseball record book (NFHS.org), Hansen set a new national record by hitting grand slams in three consecutive at-bats in separate innings. Hitting out of the cleanup spot, he hit a no-out grand slam in the first inning. He followed that up with a two-out grand slam in the second inning. His final grand slam came in the fourth inning with no outs. According to the NFHS record book, six players shared the previous record with grand slams in two consecutive at-bats in separate innings. The most recent was Corey Bell of West Point James O'Neill (N.Y.) in 2007. According to the NFHS record book, Hansen is the sixth player to hit three grand slams in one game. The most recent was Zac Jancek of Montague (Mi.) in 2005.

MARSH HIRED AS FOOTBALL COACH



Scott Marsh has been hired as the school's head football coach. Marsh is the eighth head coach in the history of Roncalli football. He served as the defensive coordinator on last season's team that went starter at linebacker and a team captain. 15-0 and won the Class 4A state title. Last season's Roncalli defense allowed just 14.6 points per game and held six opponents under 10 points. Marsh replaces Bruce Scifres, who resigned after 27 seasons to become the new executive director of the CYO (Catholic Youth Organization) for the Archdiocese of Indianapolis.

"I am honored and ready to get to work," said Marsh. "Roncalli is synonymous with excellence – academically, spiritually and athletically. This is a humbling day for me and my family."

Marsh has eight years of varsity head coaching experience, with stints at Thomas Carr Howe (2008) and Perry Meridian (2009 through 2015). While at Perry Meridian, his teams led the state in passing twice (2012 and 2013) and led all of Class 6A in rushing in 2014. In 2012 and 2013, he led Perry

Meridian to its first back-to-back winning regular seasons in a decade.

In the late 1990s, he was a graduate assistant at Morehead State University, where he played collegiately. During his college career, Marsh was a three-year

SENIOR FOOTBALL PLAYERS HONORED





GOLDEN GUARD HONORED AT GRADUATION BREAKFAST



The beautiful weather for this year's Roncalli graduation helped welcome the Bishop Chartrand and Kennedy Memorial Class of 1967 back to campus. For the 21st year, the Roncalli Alumni Association and Administration welcomed back to campus the 50-year graduating class. This year, the Class of 1967 was honored at graduation ceremonies. Everyone had a wonderful morning reminiscing about high school days and making new memories. Their morning closed by being presented with a 50-year pin and induction into the Golden Guard. From this day forward, they may enter any event at Roncalli High School whether it be sports, theater or academic competition free of charge. Congratulations Bishop Chartrand and Kennedy Memorial Class of 1967!



When Bruce Scifres was hired as Roncalli's football coach in 1990, he couldn't have imagined he'd spend the next 27 years in that role. And near the end of his nearly three decades at the school, he couldn't imagine he'd ever leave.

But Scifres, 60, is leaving. The seven-time state championship coach resigned on Monday and will take over this summer as the executive director of the Catholic Youth Organization in the Archdiocese of Indianapolis.

"The time I've been at Roncalli has been a true blessing," Scifres told IndyStar. "I've worked with amazing young people from great families. I'm a better man because of the time I've spent there. My faith is stronger as a result of me being there for 27 years. For a long time, I envisioned myself finishing my career there. It's been a calling. But now I'm moving on to another calling and an even bigger team."

Scifres led Roncalli to seven state championships to tie for fifth-most in Indiana high school football history. The Rebels were 15-0 last season, defeating NorthWood 34-22 to win the Class 4A state

championship. Roncalli also won state championships under Scifres in 1993, '94, '99, 2002, '03 and '04.

Scifres' record at Roncalli was 248-88 to rank 24th on the all-time win list in the state. He is one of nine coaches in state history to win three consecutive titles.

"As the parent of two former players in the football program, and as the principal, I frequently would tell Bruce that we could not have had a better person leading our football program," Roncalli principal Chuck Weisenbach said. "No football coach in the state of Indiana has done a better job in leading young men and being instrumental in their development of life skills. His impact on the program and our school will be sorely missed."

Scifres will replace Ed Tinder, who announced his retirement after serving as executive director of CYO for more than 30 years. Scifres said he attended a sports ministry conference last year where he was asked to write a two-sentence personal mission statement. His thoughts aligned with the opening at CYO.

"The more I thought and prayed about it, I felt in my heart like I was being spoken to," Scifres said. "The answer seemed to be very clear. CYO serves right at 24,000 young people and involved about 7,000 volunteers. As I reflected on my personal mission statement, I felt like this would be a chance to have a profound influence on young people."

Scifres, a graduate of Plainfield High School and Butler, started out as a graduate assistant at Butler in the fall of 1979. He was hired at Roncalli as the head track coach and assistant football coach in 1980. He left Roncalli for an assistant coaching position at Lawrence Central in 1983 and stayed for six years — with one year at Brownstown Central in between — before he was hired at Roncalli in 1990.

Scifres said he hopes Roncalli will look to hire from within the program.

"(To stay 27 years) is a testament in my mind to how special the school is and how awesome the kids and families are," he said. "I've had incredible colleagues. It's been a great place to teach and coach."

Dr. Anne is a clinical psychologist in the Division of Behavioral Medicine & Clinical Psychology at Cincinnati Children's Hospital



The Last WORD Chuck Weisenbach R'79, Principal



Summer Greetings!

I hope and pray that your summer to this point has been restful, relaxing and enjoyable for all in the Roncalli Family!

I will not take up much space in this article looking back but would be remiss if I did not say a quick thanks to all for a marvelous 2016-17 school year! Students, parents, teachers, and staff members - thank you for a great school year! A special thanks to the members of the Class of 2017 - what a wonderful group of talented young men and women! Thank you to them for being strong, positive, visible leaders for our school and community in so many

different ways. God's blessings on them and their life journeys!

I spend a fair amount of time these days being reflective. Not sure if this is related to my growing older, but I have come to value the beauty and power of reflection. I find myself encouraging our students and teachers, and even my own children, to be sure to include reflective time in their daily and/or weekly schedule. One life skill that has found its way into my reflections consistently this past year is the idea of personal accountability. This topic will be the focus of my article.

The general definition of accountability is "the willingness to accept responsibility for or to account for one's own actions."

My reflections on the concept of accountability are mostly driven by what I see unfolding around me in so many different facets of life. White collar professionals not accepting accountability for their illegal and/or immoral actions. Professional athletes not accepting accountability for their illegal and/or immoral actions. Politicians not accepting accountability for their illegal and/or immoral actions as well as not accepting accountability for their mistakes! On a more personal and daily level - students

not accepting accountability for their actions.

Author James Lehman wrote the following, "The simple truth is that most kids, and even some grown-ups, don't take responsibility for their actions. Without accountability in place, kids blame others for their actions, refuse to follow rules they find unfair, and find ways to justify their behavior."

Few things stunt the mental, emotional and spiritual growth of a young person more than a lack of personal accountability. All parents relish seeing their children succeed and flourish! However, it can be quite challenging and in some cases downright gut-wrenching watching our children struggle or make mistakes. However, as adults we should know that it is through the process of being held accountable for their actions and learning from these experiences that our children learn valuable, life lessons that will serve them

well as adults, in both their personal and professional lives.

Just as I commented earlier about the proliferation of high profiled business people, athletes and politicians who are unwilling to accept responsibility for their actions, I also see a proliferation of parents unwilling to allow their children to accept responsibility for their actions. This is an unhealthy foundation on which to build their future! We adults (parents, teachers, coaches, youth ministers, etc.) still love them (children/young people) unconditionally and will assist them as best we can in their life journey, but they must know with full clarity that they will be held responsible for their behavior. Anything less is in some ways neglectful on our part.

All of us in society must own our actions and be prepared

for the consequences of those actions. My intent in this article is not to imply that personal accountability pertains only to teens, but given they are at the center of the greatest amount of my daily work, I felt it appropriate to focus most specifically on them.

I close with a good exercise for all of us that ties back into my opening comments on the beauty and power of reflection. Questions for each of us to reflect upon:
