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POINT OF VIEW A Forty Year PilgrimageJoseph D. Hollowell Ed. D., President

As Roncalli gets closer and closer to celebrating its 50th year as a school community, I am preparing to celebrate a personal anniversary of sorts as well. The end of this academic year will mark the completion of 40 years of service to the Roncalli Family. I have often heard from others who have spent the majority of their professional life at one organization, "I never thought I would ever stay that long anywhere!" In retrospect, I confirm this phrase certainly applies to me.

I called Roncalli based on a tip from a friend who had heard that the school was looking for a chemistry teacher in August of 1979. When I called Bernie Dever, who was the principal at that time, he asked me if I had a chemistry degree. I said yes. I think it was so close to the start of the school year and Bernie was so desperate for a teacher that he decided to end the interview right then and ask me, "When can you come in and sign a contract?" As it turns out, perhaps Bernie should have asked me a few more questions!

Nearing the end of my first year of teaching, which I thought had gone very well, I found myself in the principal's office with Mr. Dever and Dick Schott who served as my supervising teacher. A supervising teacher was necessary because I had never gone through a student teaching program which is normally required for all

teachers before they begin their career. About five minutes into the meeting, I realized that we were talking about whether or not I was going to be offered a chance to teach for another year at Roncalli. It seems Mr. Dever did not share my opinion of how well the first year had gone!

Finally, it was determined that I would be given another chance because Mr. Schott noted that he saw some potential in my work. In all of my years at Roncalli, I have never forgotten those few minutes in the Principal's Office. And I have been forever grateful that I was given another chance to get better. Seven years later, I was on the stage with Indiana Governor Robert Orr being recognized as a charter member of the first group of 40 Indiana Academic All-Star Mentor Teachers from throughout the state - one of the most gratifying awards I have ever received. I hope that if Mr. Dever had been alive then to see that spectacle he would have felt affirmed in his decision to give me another chance at teaching.

Now at the other end of my journey at Roncalli and related to the true meaning of pilgrimage - another blessing during my time here has been the opportunity to lead the Summer Field Study program. In a few months, we will depart on our 40th trip into the mountains to hike, raft, backpack, climb, swim, and

explore the extraordinary wonders of God's creation. This coming summer we will surpass 3,000 students in terms of the number of participants who have been able to travel with us on this two-week adventure into the mountains. The combination of the challenges of living in the mountains, wandering outside of our comfort zone, and being immersed in the beauties of God's creation allows for the sacred character of the souls of our students to come to full bloom. It is a program that has truly been guided by the Holy Spirit, and it has been a unique opportunity to be a part of this experience with our students.

The idea of going on pilgrimage is to take a journey to a sacred place - often accompanied by struggle, personal growth, and a renewal in understanding of self and others. The unending theme of my pilgrimage at Roncalli has been to meet fascinating students, great families, and committed colleagues all rising to meet engaging challenges together. It is through the people I have met and the challenges we have risen to meet together that I know I have traveled through a sacred time and space on a journey that has forever changed me.

To everyone who is reading this who has been a part of my Roncalli pilgrimage I say — thank you for struggling with me, thank you for changing me, and thank you for helping me to grow. Perhaps most importantly, thank you for showing me the beauties of God through your lives uniquely and fully lived.

May God bless you and all of those dear to you in every good way!

MINTON VALEDICTORIAN, BLANKENBERGER SALUTATORIAN

Senior **Katie Minton** was named the Valedictorian and senior **Amanda Blankenberger** was named Salutatorian for the Roncalli High School class of 2019.

Minton selected Roncalli's most challenging curriculum throughout her high school career including seven Advanced Placement classes and 14 additional honors and accelerated courses. She earned no grade lower than an A in any class, not even an A-. Minton also earned a perfect score, twice, on the Reading portion of the ACT and is an AP Scholar with Distinction after scoring a five, the highest score, on three different AP exams.

Outside of the classroom, Minton serves as the Dance Captain for Show Choir. She is also a four-year varsity athlete in two sports: Cross Country and Track and Field and earned the Team Excellence Award every year.

Minton, who attended Nativity grade school, plans to attend the University of Notre Dame where she will major in pre-health. She is the daughter of Linda and Andy Minton.

At the end of Blankenberger's senior year, she will have completed 38 semesters of Honors, AP or accelerated coursework. She is an AP Scholar with Honor, and her test scores put her in the 99th percentile on both the SAT and the ACT.

While at Roncalli, she has received many awards, including the Catholic Math League Advanced Math award, the Spanish 1 student of the year award, the 2017 Indiana Association of School Principals "Rising Star" award and she is a National Merit Commended student.

Blankenberger has shown tremendous leadership and time-management skills. She is a dance instructor, volunteers at a non-profit organization that serves adults living with life-altering diagnoses, co-founded a dance club through Roncalli, participates in both the Physics Club, and Ski Club and several competitive dance teams. She received the Senior Legacy Award for her high school dance team and mentors middle school students in an abstinence program through a Promise to Keep.

She is the daughter of Martha and Terry Blankenberger. She attended Our Lady of the Greenwood grade school and plans to attend Purdue next fall to study bio chemistry.



REBELS NAMED RISING STARS



In response to the schools growing diversity, Roncalli High School launched in March 2018 a student outreach program to help our diverse student population feel a sense of belonging. Each month, **Kevin Banich R'09**, assistant principal for student life, and Kelley Fisher, Catholic Charities social worker, have a lunch meeting with eight to ten students to hear their stories and listen to their perspectives on student life at Roncalli. The students created the group's name, "We C.A.R.E." which stands for "Cultural Awareness & Racial Education."

Junior **Angie Snow**, a member of this group commented, "As a group, we get together every other month to advocate for growth and continued support. We invite everyone with open arms into our family."

Through open dialogue with the students, the school continues to empower them to create a more welcoming environment. In addition, the administration is currently working on a grant proposal that will assist the school in better communicating with our Burmese and Latino students and families.



TEACHER'S CREATION OF 'STARS' PROGRAM LEADS TO CELEBRATING CATHOLIC SCHOOL VALUES HONOR

The moment will always stay with **Pat Musgrave Hon'13**—reminding her of the potential of her students while also reaffirming the difference she has made in their lives.

The moment happened during an all-school assembly at Roncalli High School in Indianapolis, where Musgrave led its special education program for 24 years.

"I worked extremely hard to develop a program where students could have a Catholic education, attend school with their siblings and peers, and feel safe and accepted. I knew that had been achieved during a pep session at Roncalli," she notes, referring to the moment that involved the school's principal, **Chuck Weisenbach R'79**.

"There was a young man with autism that struggled with the sounds at the pep sessions, but loved the energy. We worked it out that he would attend, but be on stage where the sound was not coming directly at him. Mr. Weisenbach happened to be on stage with the student at the time that one of the faculty members was energizing the crowd with a dance from Napoleon Dynamite.

"The student on stage was shouting directions to the faculty member when Mr. Weisenbach told him to go out onto the floor and show him how it was done. As the student joined the faculty member on the floor, the entire student body erupted into cheers and stood in

unison to cheer him on. This is when I knew that the program at Roncalli had achieved success."

'The biggest success story'

That moment revealed many of the goals that Musgrave had for her students: to make them realize they have strengths, that they could have success, and that they are a valuable part of their community. It also revealed her willingness to have them take risks—a quality that defines her, too, says Roncalli's president **Joseph Hollowell Hon'97**.

"In 1993, she took a calculated risk and accepted a position at Roncalli where she would be responsible for creating a special education program from scratch," Hollowell notes. "The common sentiment was that a successful special needs program could not be done in a Catholic high school. There certainly were no models in the state of Indiana to emulate at that time."

Twenty-five years later, the special needs program at Roncalli that is called STARS—Students That Are Ready for Success—"may be the biggest success story in our school's history," says Hollowell.

The program that started with five students in 1993 at

Roncalli now serves more than 150 students, representing about 15 percent of the school's enrollment.

"Expanding the scope of the students we serve here has been uplifting, enriching and beneficial on many fronts," Hollowell says. "It also has been challenging. However, Pat never flinched.

"Today, Catholic educators come from all across the country to observe and learn from the Roncalli STARS program. Pat's efforts have truly impacted our nation's Catholic schools."

A life of promoting acceptance, faith

While coming to Roncalli can be viewed as a risk, Musgrave viewed it as an opportunity—an opportunity to influence the students she loves in an educational setting where she could also live and model her Catholic faith.

Before arriving at Roncalli, she had taught in public schools for 15 years.

"I knew that my degree in special education would make it difficult to teach in the Catholic school system as there were very few programs," she says. "When Roncalli decided to start a special education program, I jumped at the opportunity."

A leap into a Catholic faith community was also a significant part of the move for her.

"I wanted to be in a community that had the same faith values as I had," says Musgrave, a member of St. Roch Parish in Indianapolis and a 1973 graduate of Our Lady of Providence High School in Clarksville.

"I had 12 years of Catholic education. I always felt it was a very good, very challenging education. It also challenged me to serve others."

Beyond leading the students in the STARS program, she also strived to connect with the other students at Roncalli. Before retiring last year, she also served as a costume coordinator in the theater department, an adult leader on service trips to Appalachia, and an adult leader on spiritual retreats.

As much as she contributed to Roncalli, she is equally grateful for the influence of the students and staff who touched her life during her 24 years there. And she is especially thankful for her husband of 41 years, Dennis.

They're all part of her lifetime journey of trying to add a measure of understanding, acceptance and faith to the world.

"It's been very rewarding," she says. "I felt like a member of the family at Roncalli. I just enjoyed being part of a community that allowed me to talk to the kids about my faith and their faith—to talk about morals and values."

"Is this a joke? John Smith?"

This expression of disbelief was given by the Director of Advancement Tina Hayes when she heard the unusually generic name of a photographer recommended to Roncalli. She soon realized, though, that John Smith was no joke when it came to taking pictures. The more interesting story, however, happens to be the way that Smith came to be the go-to Roncalli photographer.

"I've always been interested in photography," Smith said. "When I was a freshman in college one of the guys on my floor needed some money, so he sold me his 35mm camera for \$40."

He used the camera in college, but after graduating put it aside for a while. It wasn't until his youngest daughter **Jen (R'18)** started playing softball that he got back into the hobby.

Eventually, he saw an email by the football parents association asking for volunteers to take photos at games. This was where he was "discovered" by Roncalli parents and recommended to the administration.

"He was just on his own out of the goodness of his heart going to games and taking these really amazing photographs," Hayes said.

Although not formally employed by Roncalli, Smith receives a small stipend for each event worked, but what he does is mostly just out of an enjoyment of photography and a love for Roncalli.

"It's amazing," Smith said. "I don't know if you truly know how special RHS is compared to most other schools. The pre-game activities, the prayer, the band playing the anthem, the drum corps pounding, the crowd chanting "Here Come The Rebels!", the team running down the hill bursting through the banner, cheerleaders doing flips, flags flying, the crowd roaring."

During the day, Smith works at Kennedy Tank and Manufacturing, where he designs heat exchangers. He's been working there for 30 years now, but still finds time for Roncalli.

"He's never turned us down before to be at an event," Hayes said. "Never."

This is quite the accomplishment considering how many events he is asked to attend. He says his previous years volunteering for St. Mark CYO events have prepared him for this commitment. He used to coach basketball, football, wrestling, and track, but has had to cut back on some of these.



Junior **Mychal Allen**, who had Smith as a football coach in 7th grade, has only positive things to say about his former coach.

"Whenever I get the opportunity to talk to him, he asks how I'm doing and how football is," Allen said. "He cares so much about everyone else, and it's super humbling. During our last football game it started raining, and he gave his camera towels to the players, risking his camera."

When asked about his favorite sport to photograph, Smith replied, "I enjoy all sports. I really enjoy watching volleyball, especially boys volleyball. I didn't know much about it until a few years ago. I also enjoy the plays and the concerts."

No matter what event it is though, Smith's work is very much appreciated, both by students and administration alike.

BORING WINS LORENZANO SCHOLARSHIP





C9 RONCALLI STUDENT EXPERIENCE

Senior **Lorenzo Salazar** is one of eight Roncalli students that are enrolled in the programs at Central Nine Career Center. He chose to go to C9 because it offered specific instruction in his chosen career field, criminal justice. He is the son of Pamela and Erwin Salazar. Erwin, who is also a board member at Roncalli, said that Lorenzo, "LJ," was the motivator in the decision to send their son to C9. He liked the technical aspect of using simulators, being handson and said that LJ has always been interested in law enforcement. The courses at C9 are taught by retired law enforcement personnel. Erwin is an Aviation Instructor at C9. He teaches courses such as "Aviation Flight," "Aviation Operations" and other courses which are dual credit classes with Ivy Tech.

Lorenzo said, "I feel that C9 has been very beneficial to me. The coursework is very hands-on and offers a lot more than just traditional schoolwork. I feel that my time in school has been well spent at C9." He attends daily classes at Roncalli during periods 1 thru 4 and then travels to C9 for instruction from 11:40 AM - 2:17 PM except on Wednesdays when the students are dismissed at 1:30 PM. Lorenzo is also a four year wrestler and has completed nearly 300 lifetime service hours.

When describing what he does at C9, Lorenzo said, "Monday, Wednesday and Friday, our class does PT (physical training) which ranges from running to handcuffing techniques, to pressure points. The activities that we do in our class vary a lot, and C9 also offers many opportunities for success. I am involved in the Indiana Governor's Work Ethic Certification. Upon completion, I have already received several job offers ranging from the Indiana Department of Corrections to Dayton Freight."

Lorenzo's dad, Erwin, commends Roncalli on the great job that it does to prepare students for college and believes that the emphasis on C9 should continue for students that do not plan to attend college. He thinks that C9 could be a good choice for many students.

"C9 is by far the most beneficial and hands-on learning experience I have had in high school. I think that more Roncalli students should consider C9," said Lorenzo.



BOYS BASKETBALL

For the first since the time 2012-13 season, the boys basketball team had to replace all five starters from the previous season. The Rebels returned just 51 points from last season's 18-7 squad. The 51 points are the fewest amount of points the Rebels have returned in the 50-year history of the program. The 2018-19 Rebels posted a 5-17 record against a schedule rated one of the 40-most difficult in the state. Five Roncalli opponents - Beech Grove, Center Grove, Heritage Christian, Lanesville and New Palestine - won sectional titles and four others lost in the sectional final. Out of Roncalli's 22 games, nine were decided by five points or less. The Rebels played nine games against teams ranked in the top 64 in the Sagarin statewide computer poll and three games against the top 25.

Senior **Jacob Denney** led the team in scoring with a 12.9 points per game average. Denney scored in double figures in 17 of 22 games and topped 20 points twice. Sophomore **Anthony Donahue** finished second on the team in scoring at 11.3 points per game. Donahue's 249 total points were the most scored by a sophomore since the 2004-05 season. Junior **Aidan Looney** led the team in rebounding, grabbing 5.1 boards per game. Sophomore **Johnny Brunk** paced the team in assists, averaging 4.0 per game. Denney, Donahue, Looney and juniors **Daniel Asher** and **Nick Spearing** played in all 22 games, but Denney was the only player to start all 22. The team shot 75.9 percent from the foul line, which is the second-best season percentage over the last 17 seasons. Denney was named to the All-

BOWLING

Boys Bowling

The boys bowling team worked through graduating three of last season's top performers and earned two regular-season wins.

The team finished 11th in the sectional. Junior **Jack Matthews** earned team MVP honors. Matthews was also named to the Indy South All-Conference team, making him one of the top six bowlers out of 150 boys.

Girls Bowling

The girls bowling team finished with a 5-5 record and earned a win over Greenfield-Central, Shelbyville, Greenwood Christian Academy and multiple wins over New Palestine. The team finished fifth in the sectional. Junior **Faith Holden** individually qualified for the regional and then advanced to the semi-state for the second-straight season. Holden was named the team's MVP.



The 2019 Roncalli wrestling built on last season's successes and took them to an even higher level, accomplishing feats never before reached in program history. They advanced all 14 wrestlers from the sectional on to the regional round for the second consecutive season. They captured the program's first-ever semi-state title. For the second-straight season, four Roncalli wrestlers medaled at the same state finals, but this year's group was the first to have all four wrestlers finish in the top four of their respective weight classes. As a result, the team scored a program state-record 53 points and finished sixth, for the program's best team finish since 2011.

The Rebels piled up impressive regular-season credentials, finishing second in the Marion County meet, winning the prestigious 32-team Connersville Spartan Holiday Classic and the 16-team Westfield Shamrock Duals Tournament, and finishing sixth in the Team State Duals. The team compiled a 17-3 regular-season record and won its third-straight Circle City Conference title. In the conference meet, the Rebels won titles in 11 of the 14 weight classes.

In the postseason, the Rebels finished second in the sectional and advanced all 14 wrestlers to the regional round. The Rebels had six individual regional champions (twice as many as any other school) and finished third in the team standings. The following week, it all came together for the Rebels, as five of the eight wrestlers advanced to the semifinal round and four of the five won semi-state titles. That effort earned the Rebels the semi-state team title, 6.5 points ahead of Cathedral.

Junior Alec Viduya finished as the runner-up in the 132-pound class and concluded his season with a 41-2 record. Viduya's effort marks the 14th time in program history that a Roncalli wrestler finished first or second at the state final. Viduya won a Marion County title, a Circle City Conference title, as well as sectional, regional and semi-state crowns. Senior Elijah Mahan finished third in the 170-pound class for the best state finish of his career. Mahan wrapped up his senior season with a 40-2 record, to go along with Marion County,



Founders Day – 50 Years Later

Most who have been around Roncalli any length of time, know that when Kennedy Memorial and Bishop Chartrand merged 50 years ago to create a new high school named Roncalli that many hearts were broken and hard feelings remained for years. Some, even today, harbor harsh feelings towards those responsible for what many thought was an injustice on both sides. However, had the merger never taken place, it is possible that today we might not have a Catholic high school on the southside much less the thriving school that Roncalli has become. It is widely known that with the beginning of the fall semester in 1969, students from both Kennedy and Chartrand came together and worked out most of their conflicts peacefully.

What isn't widely known is the day it all became official. The day Roncalli was born is April 17, 1969. On this day the combined Indianapolis Deaneries Board approved the request of both Presidents of both Student Councils to name the new school, "Roncalli" – the family name of good Pope John, now St. John XXIII. With this agreement authorized, **Fr. Robert Kitchin Hon'07**, Chartrand Principal at the time wrote the following, "This ends thirty days in utter misery and confusion, doubting themselves and one another, completely unable to decipher what their true obligations might be." Fr. Kitchin was recognized in 2007 as an Honorary Alumni of Roncalli High School and passed away on December 17, 2010, at the age of 88. He was laid to rest at St. Mary's Cemetery in his hometown of Richmond, Indiana.

Early Growing Pains

When Roncalli was founded back in 1969, it was not uncommon for fans from other schools to think the new name was Ron Calli believing we were named after a man named Ronald Calli. The local Emroe's Sporting Goods located at Southern Plaza shopping center even sold gym bags at the time with Ron Calli emblazoned on the side. It took a few years but soon the Rebels began making a name for themselves in the classroom and on the field. The sports pages and local merchants no longer referred to the new school as Ron Calli.

On January 10, 2019, Roncalli officially went live with video streaming when the Lady Rebels basketball team faced off against Indian Creek for a home game. Initially, the Rebel Media Network went on the air in the fall of 2007 as an audio only broadcast and that has worked well for all these years as Rob Brown, the principle play-by-play person leading the broadcasts. Today, with the cooperation of the Director of Web and Graphic Design, Stefan Welsh, and his videography class, the Roncalli network has branched out in a big way. Many schools in the area video broadcast athletic contests but most use a single camera operated by the play-by-play announcer or color analyst. Roncalli's broadcast uses students from Mr. Welsh's class to direct the event, operating two cameras and also creating graphics and video for commercial spots. Statistics are kept while the game is in action and shared during the broadcasts. The students get service hours and/or a class grade for working events that are live streamed. This spring boys volleyball, track and field, baseball, softball and lacrosse are all scheduled to share some video air time on the Rebel Media Network and can be accessed via Youtube or Facebook. THE LAST WORD
School Safety

An issue that is of paramount importance for all levels of education in our country today (elementary, middle, high school and college) is that of security. The safety of students, teachers and staff members while at school is the top priority for every school and college! In this edition of the UPDATE, I will speak to the issue of school safety from several different perspectives.

Personnel

Since 2004, we have contracted with an IMPD officer to oversee all of our "in person" security needs. This person is responsible for scheduling the coverage of armed security during the school day as well as at campus events (athletic contests, fine arts events, fundraisers, etc.). This person, along with fellow IMPD, provide the school with relevant, up to date information on all issues pertaining to school safety as well as provide training for our faculty and staff. We benefit immensely from the training they receive as IMPD officers, and Roncalli is blessed to have these officers as a part of our school team. We appreciate immensely all that they do, seen and unseen, to make our school and campus a safe place for all!

Campus Security

The regular presence of armed security on campus that

started in 2004 resulted in an immediate, dramatic decrease in the amount of vandalism our school was incurring during non-school hours. For some time now, we have experienced very little in the way of vandalism to our school and/or facilities.

In The Building Security

This aspect of security has changed significantly we started working with our security officers in 2004. Fifteen years ago, there was very little presence of armed security in the school itself with the exception of the normal security at home athletic contests. Per the recommendation of these professionals, we now have armed security in our school on a random, rotating basis. There is always armed security in our school when an all school event is being held, such as an all school liturgy, pep session or guest speaker. We also have armed security in the cafeteria during lunch periods on a consistent basis.

Our video security system consists of cameras outside and inside the school building. As our campus continues to grow we hope to expand the number of cameras, both in and out of the building.

It was not that long ago that most schools' front lobby doors were unlocked and provided unhindered entrance into the school. That is no longer the case as all schools, including Roncalli, require locked doors during the school day and are equipped with some type of "buzz in" procedure that provides some level of control as to who enters your school building.

Training

The most consistent aspect of training as it relates to school safety continues to focus on simulations (fire drills, tornado drills and lockdown/armed intruder drills). Law enforcement is not involved with our fire and tornado drills. However, they are heavily

involved and participate in our armed intruder lockdown simulations. They consistently pass on to our administration the latest in best practices for schools when dealing with an armed intruder(s). Our security officers participate in our lockdown simulations and provide us with feedback on what was done well and what must be improved.

Threat Assessment

While threats were probably being directed toward schools prior to social media, there is no denying that the number of threats directed toward schools has risen sharply via the use of some type of social media. On occasion through the years there have been times when Roncalli has had to deal with alleged threats directed toward the school. While each situation has its own unique set of variables, there are standard operating procedures when such a situation exists. They include the following: (1) contact law enforcement and involve them in the investigation, (2) contact the archdiocese, (3) conduct on our own investigation if the threat involves a Roncalli

student(s), (4) on occasion, the investigative process can involve mental health professionals who may be asked to conduct a threat assessment for the student(s). This comprehensive approach to investigating the situation allows the school to make a decision on how best to proceed based on the recommendation of both law enforcement and mental health professionals.

Quality academic programming, faith formation, exemplary athletic, fine and arts student activities programs, and community service opportunities are all very important to Roncalli and to any school! But, they all pale in comparison to the safety of our students, teachers and staff members! Please join me in praying for the ongoing safety not only of RHS students, teachers and staff members but for all schools' students, teachers and staff members.
